Dr. Paul Tiyambe Zeleza is the Vice President of Academic Affairs and Professor of History at Quinnipiac University, Hamden, Connecticut. Dr. Zeleza's academic work has crossed traditional boundaries, ranging from economic and intellectual history to human rights, gender studies, and diaspora studies. He has published more than 300 journal articles, book chapters, reviews, short stories and online essays and authored or edited 27 books, several of which have won international awards including Africa's most prestigious book prize, the Noma Award, for his books *A Modern Economic History of Africa* (1993) and *Manufacturing African Studies and Crises* (1997). His most recent books include *In Search of African Diasporas: Testimonies and Encounters* (2012) and *Africa's Resurgence: Domestic, Global and Diaspora Transformations* (2015).
