**TC2C requires a minimum of 7 total courses to include the following:** EC 11 or 16, EC 130, EC 30, 1 Political Economy, 1 History, 1 Culture, 1 Research Methods, and 1 Capstone/Seminar (Note: EC 130 is approved for the seminar requirement).
